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
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
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
### Trowell my village 1944 to 1965 By David Thompson

How quickly places and ways of life change, and how just as quickly they are lost or forgotten. For this reason I decided to put down my memories of Trowell purely as I remember it. It is not intended to be an accurate history of Trowell and its residents, just a few of my memories from my time in the village of Trowell, the place that I will always call home. I am sure there is much that I have missed as I never kept any record or pictures, just used my old memory that in itself could lead to inaccuracy due to a fading memory.

A brief description of Trowell
This is a brief description of Trowell as I remember it circa 1950s, starting at the River Erewash Bridge near to Furnace Road, the border with Ilkeston and Derbyshire, walking east towards Nottingham.

Immediately on the left of Ilkeston Road, adjacent to the footpath leading towards the rail-way footbridge was the Flour Mill, then known as Eagle Mill, previously known as Victoria Mill, and later to become a furniture manufacturing business, and finally storage for tyres. Nothing remains today as it was virtually destroyed by fire in 2010. The remains were finally cleared away in 2011.

Back in the 1950s it was a working flour mill and it was always covered in a fine dusting of white flour. This flour also covered the surrounding hedges, road and trees near to the mill. The footpath alongside still remains leading to the footbridge over the railway lines of the Erewash Valley Line and leads to Stoney Lane and up to the former Wollaton Canal.

Not many trains pass now, but in the 1950s there would be train after train in both directions, mainly freight trains carrying coal in one direction and empty wagons in the other direction, from the many East Midlands coalfields and other coalfields further north. Also there were many express London bound passenger trains and their returns, all hauled by steam engines. None of these express trains stopped at Trowell.

At the south side of Eagle Mill were the railway station and station yard. Here coal wagons were marshalled and unloaded by local coal merchants. Coal was loaded into bags that when full, weighed one hundredweight. These were and then loaded onto their lorries for delivery to households in the area. Other freight for local delivery was also in the yard, and a crane was fixed in the station yard to help with loading and unloading of other goods.

Later on this line was extended into a new factory built on Furnace Road, a distribution warehouse for Cadburys Chocolate, so that chocolate all came in by rail before redistribution by road to the shops. This factory has changed occupiers a number of times from Cadburys to Boots the chemist and then again to upholstery manufacturing.

### How you can help prevent unwanted telephone sales calls

Tottinghamshire Police Pre-Crime Unit would like to make residents aware of the Telephone Preference Service. We appreciate that some of you may already be aware of this service, however, for those who aren't, please read the information below regarding the service.

The Telephone Preference Service (TPS) helps you to make sure your telephone number is no longer available to organisations who may telephone you with offers and information you do not wish to receive. Registration with the Telephone Preference Service (TPS) is free.

Under Government legislation introduced on 1 May 1999 it is unlawful to make direct marketing calls to individuals who have indicated that they do not want to receive such calls. You can either do this by contacting companies directly and asking them not to phone you or you can register with a central service such as the Telephone Preference Service to stop all such calls.

Before you apply however, you may want to consider that of the Pre-Crime Unit. registering could prevent you from receiving information which you would really like to have about relevant and worthwhile opportunities. Registration will prevent or-

ganisations who regard you as a customer from contacting you again, unless you have previously told them that you have no objection to them calling you.

Registering with the Telephone Preference Service will not stop calls from market research organisations. If you also wish to stop these calls or any other non-direct marketing calls, you will need to contact each company directly.

There are three ways to register with the Telephone Preference Service.

The quickest way you can register is on the TPS website at www.tpsonline.org.uk and by clicking on the link to register.

Alternatively you can call the registration line 0845 070 0707 (local call rate). You will be asked to record the telephone number you wish to register and the system will then confirm the registration. It will take up to 28 days for your registration to take effect.

You will remain registered on file unless you change your telephone number.

We will be on call 24hrs a day 7 days a week and can be called out in all weather conditions to search for missing people of all ages.

We currently have a team of 27 volunteers in our unit from a wide range of backgrounds including paramedics, firefighters, teachers and construction workers.

### **Christmas Lights**

he Parish Council has recently received a petition and letters asking for the reinstatement of the Christmas lights.

As previously reported we had hoped to have had installed by now uplighters to illuminate various trees around the village. Unfortunately this proved to be impossible, as the lights could not be installed close enough to the trees to have the de-

sired effect. We were not allowed to install as close to the tree trunk as we wished, because of objections from the County Council tree officer. that were installed on Stapleford Road one was damaged but had already been vandalised. On the three remaining ones we are hoping to fit tilting lenses.

We were offered a deal by Nottinghamshire County Council to light a tree at Christmas 2012, but the date given for installation was far too late to be practical, and the cost for a few days' illumination was excessive. A proposal for re-lighting certain trees in the village is about to be put to the Parish Council, and this will be considered in due course.



Over the last ten years (up to and including 2012), £31,191 has been spent on lights, and this does not include the considerable time the Clerk has spent in dealing with all the bureaucracy involved in getting permission to erect the lights.

### FOR INFORMATION

Why the 1.36% increase in the parish precept? In cash terms the Parish Council has increased its spending by £689 or 1.17% in 2013/2014 compared to 2012/2013. This is mainly to cover increased running costs e.g. gas, printing, insurance, refuse collection etc, whilst still being able to move forward with planned improvements such as a new Christmas lighting display. However, due to the new changes to the Council Tax system, introduced by central Government, Trowell's "Council Tax Base" for this year has been reduced by 49 properties, & although the Parish Council has received a grant from Government because of this reduction, it does not quite cover the shortfall created, hence the increase. It should also be noted that the grant is only guaranteed for this year & may not be available next year, & so the Parish Council thought it prudent to have a small increase this year to try & lessen the impact next year, should the grant not be forthcoming in future years.
