Funding and guidance available to support setting up new County schemes.

Thanks to the contribution from Members of the Community Safety Committee of Nottinghamshire County Council in supporting the growth of NHW across the County, and the financial grant of £10,000 spearheaded by the Committee's Chairman Councillor Glynn Gilfoyle, there is currently funding to support the setting up of new schemes throughout the county.

All coordinators of registered schemes are covered by indemnity insurance up to £10 million.

The NHW movement can use its capable volunteers to strengthen & assist the Police and other partners in order to prevent and reduce crime & the fear of crime.

The NHW movement is well structured.
